
Anxious People by Fredrik Backman

Anxious People is a poignant, charming novel about a crime that never took place, a would-be bank robber who disappears into thin air, and eight extremely anxious strangers who find they have more in common than they ever imagined.

The Mystery of Mrs. Christie by Marie Benedict

The Mystery of Mrs. Christie tells two stories simultaneously; the first of how Archie and Agatha met and how they gradually fell out of love with one another. The second plot line sheds light on Archie's day-to-day life during the eleven days of Agatha's disappearance.





The Double Bind by Chris Bohjalian

Working at a homeless shelter, Laurel Estabrook encounters Bobbie Crocker, a man with a history of mental illness and a box of secret photos, but when Bobbie dies suddenly, Laurel embarks on an obsessive search for the truth behind the photos.

The Guest List by Lucy Foley

Appearances can be deceiving as pretty boy Will Slater and the elegant Jules Keegan appear to be the perfect couple, but there is a dark side of Will lurking below the surface. The past and the present collide as old high school and college friends reminisce their wilder days, uncovering secrets Will has tried to keep hidden.

Based on a true story of a New York socialite who championed a group of concentration camp survivors known as the Rabbits, *Lilac Girls* reveals a story of love, redemption and terrible secrets that were hidden for decades.

Pachinko by Min Jin Lee

In the early 1900s, teenaged Sunja falls for a wealthy stranger but when she discovers she is pregnant and that her lover is married she refuses to be bought. Instead, she accepts an offer of marriage from a gentle, sickly minister passing through on his way to Japan. Her decision to abandon her home and reject her son's powerful father sets off a dramatic saga that will echo down through the generations.

Finding Dorothy by Elizabeth Letts

When learns that M-G-M is adapting her late husband's masterpiece for the screen, 77-year-old Maud Gage Baum sets about trying to finagle her way onto the set to help the producers stay true to the spirit of the book. The moment she hears Judy Garland rehearsing the first notes of "Over the Rainbow," Maud recognizes the yearning that defined her own life story. Judy reminds Maud of a young girl she cared for and tried to help, a dreamer who never got her happy ending. Now, with the young actress under pressure from the studio as well as her ambitious stage mother, Maud resolves to protect her—the way she tried so hard to protect the real Dorothy.






Deacon King Kong by James McBride

In September 1969, a fumbling, cranky old church deacon known as Sportcoat shuffles into the courtyard of the Cause Houses housing project in south Brooklyn, pulls a .38 from his pocket, and in front of everybody shoots the project's drug dealer. McBride brings to vivid life the people affected by the shooting. As the story deepens, it becomes clear that the lives of the characters—caught in the tumultuous swirl of 1960s New York—overlap in unexpected ways. When the truth does emerge, McBride shows us that not all secrets are meant to be hidden, that the best way to grow is to face change without fear, and that the seeds of love lie in hope and compassion.

The Silent Patient by Alex Michaelides

Alicia Berenson is a well-known painter who murdered her husband six years ago and hasn't spoken a word since. He was found bound to a chair with gunshot wounds to his face, and she was convicted soon thereafter. Her psychotherapist, Theo Faber, hopes to treat Alicia and uncover the mystery behind her motives for killing her husband.






HAMNET by Maggie O'Farrell

Drawing on Maggie O'Farrell's long-term fascination with the little-known story behind Shakespeare's most enigmatic play, HAMNET is a luminous portrait of a marriage, at its heart the loss of a beloved child. Warwickshire in the 1580s. Agnes is a woman as feared as she is sought after for her unusual gifts. She settles with her husband in Henley street, Stratford, and has three children: a daughter, Susanna, and then twins, Hamnet and Judith. The boy, Hamnet, dies in 1596, aged eleven. Four years or so later, the husband writes a play called Hamlet.





Malibu Rising by Taylor Jenkins Reid

Malibu Rising is the story of the Riva family—surfer siblings Nina, Jay, Hud, and Kit, as well as their mother June and their father, the famous singer, Mick Riva. It takes place over the twenty-four hours leading up to Nina Riva's infamous Riva Party, but it is also a culmination of generations of secrets and traumas.

My Dark Vanessa by Kate Elizabeth Russell

Exploring the psychological dynamics of the relationship between a precocious yet naïve teenage girl and her magnetic and manipulative teacher, a brilliant, all-consuming read that marks the explosive debut of an extraordinary new writer.






The Kitchen Front by Jennifer Ryan

The Storied Life of A. J. Fikry by Gabrielle Zevin



The Radium Girls by Kate Moore

This is the story of hundreds of young, vibrant women who were sentenced to death by their employers. The so-called "Radium Girls" painted luminescent faces on clock and watch dials using a paint mixture that contained radium. Instructed to "lip-point" their brushes as they painted, they absorbed high doses of radium into their bodies. When the effects of the radium led to horrific disfigurement and pain, the company refused to take responsibility.





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
