History

Utopian Commune: The Oneida Community

Thursday, April 11 • 7 p.m.

The Oneida Community was one of the most radical and successful utopian communes in American history. Nearly 300 people inhabited its sprawling Mansion House in an attempt to live as "heaven on earth". Led by the charismatic preacher John Humphrey Noyes, followers held all property in common and



developed revolutionary ideas about marriage, family, sex, industry, and the role of women in 19th century America. After 30 years, the Community disbanded and became a socially progressive silverware company--Oneida Ltd. This lecture is presented by Tom Guiler, the Oneida Community Mansion House's Director of Museum Affairs.

Afterwards, we will enjoy a tour of the mansion.

March 18: The Sugarbush at Beaver Lake Nature Center*—

Join a naturalist at Beaver Lake on a walk to the Sugarbush and exploration of the different stations and stages involved in tapping for maple sugar. Please wear appropriate footwear and clothing. Beaver Lake recommends warm layers including hats and gloves, good walking shoes or boots, and possibly a rain coat. Meet at Beaver Lake Nature Center (8477 East Mud Lake Rd., Baldwinsville). April 22: Wilcox Octagon House Museum in Camillus*— The Wilcox Octagon house is a rare home built in 1856, and is on the National Registry of Historical Places. It is one of the few octagon homes left in the eastern part of the United States that is restored. Unique to this house is the central staircase where you can travel through 5 different floors, and up 62 steps to the cupola where you can view all of Camillus. Please be aware that there are no elevators and participants should feel comfortable climbing steep, circular staircases. Meet at the Wilcox Octagon House (5420 W Genesee St, Camillus).

Since 1993, they have performed concerts and celebrations in Europe, Israel, and in the northeast US.

March 10: Joe Davoli & Bob Halligan— Award-winning musician Joe Davoli performs several styles of music including Celtic, rock, jazz, bluegrass, blues, and classical. He has composed and recorded music for an off-Broadway revival, served as musical supervisor for a short film, and has published a successful method book for fiddle and mandolin. Composerpianist Bob Halligan is an accomplished songwriter, having penned tunes recorded by artists as disparate as Michael Bolton and Blue Öyster Cult. Both Davoli and Halligan are members of Ceili Rain, a band that fuses Celtic music with Christian rock.

April 14: The Kambuyu Marimba Ensemble— The Kambuyu Marimba Ensemble plays music rooted in the traditional Shona songs and rhythms of Zimbabwe. In addition to seven marimbas, the ensemble features hosho (gourd rattles), singing, clapping, and drums. The group plays happy, percussive music — very rhythmic and driving — meant for dancing.

Science & Engineering Fair @ LPL*



- **Register each display**. If multiple students are working on the same display, they need only register once under the team name.

- Be prepared to answer questions about your project during the event.
